2017 US-Japan Journalism Fellows Announced

NEW YORK, NY, August 2, 2017—The Japan Center for International Exchange is pleased to announce this year's recipients of the JCIE US-Japan Journalism Fellowship:

Susie Armitage, BuzzFeed

The fellows will travel to Japan in early September to gain a deeper understanding of Japanese policymaking and the dynamics of US-Japan relations. Participants take part in a structured, weeklong program of meetings with Japanese policymakers, social leaders, and innovators, then stay in Japan for one to two more weeks of individualized meetings and site visits that let them develop stories for publication or broadcast.

At a time when Asia seems destined to play an increasingly prominent role in global affairs, the US relationship with Japan is a key to American policy in the region. This program gives outstanding journalists whose reporting will benefit from a deeper understanding of Japanese politics, economics, society, and foreign policy a rare chance to discuss the pressing issues of the day with leaders from different sectors of Japanese society. By exposing participants to leaders and thinkers with a variety of viewpoints, the program aims to develop a cadre of journalists who have a sophisticated understanding of the complex dynamics that shape US-Japan relations and, more broadly, the US role in Asia. It also helps them develop their professional network with experts in the region.

The Japan Center for International Exchange (JCIE/USA) is a nonprofit policy institute founded in New York in 1975. JCIE/USA conducts political exchange programs for leading American and Japanese policymakers, carries out policy research and dialogue projects on pressing international issues, and works to promote a greater understanding of civil society and philanthropy in Japan and the Asia Pacific region. The organization works in partnership with JCIE/Japan, one of the few truly independent think tanks in the field of international affairs in Japan. This program is generously supported with funding from the United States–Japan Foundation, a US private foundation committed to promoting stronger ties between Americans and Japanese.
